This was instrumental in establishing the current strategic plan and many of our practices.

And thirdly, we will be reviewing our accounts to ensure we remain in a fiscally sound position so that we can prosper into the future. Naturally these items all interconnect and the August Standing Committee should see a bringing together of reviews so that we take all matters into account in re-setting our overall direction.

I am excited that this year will see two 50 year badges given to the two Franks. Frank Arnott in June, and Frank Ansell in December. These are very special celebrations and I encourage all BA brethren to attend. In the meantime I hope to see you at Camaraderie night in May with our esteemed speaker Dr Frances Pitsilis.

100 Years Ago

Correspondence

From Messrs Nicholson & Griffin enclosing a/c for legal expenses. The account was referred to W. Bro Barrty who undertook to interview the above firm with respect to a disputed item in the a/c.

Expenses

The sum of one pound one shilling was given to the Plunket Nurse Fund and five pounds agreed to be handed over as the Lodges contribution to the fund for assisting Bro. P.H. Wood.

The Treasurers Balance was declared as being Bank a/c £32.7.9. In hand £31.14.9. The following a/c's were passed for payment. Printing 1/5/-. Gas Co. 10/4/-. McMintire Refreshments 1/6/1. Tyler 1/-/-. Total £4.1.5

JACOBS LADDER

Jacob's Ladder is the centre piece of the First
Degree Tracing Board, but what is the symbolism of
this ladder depicted as such an ornate stairway to
heaven.

Chapter 28 in the book of Genesis tells of Jacob's journey to Haren and his mystical dream whilst sleeping with a stone* as a pillow.

The Ladder was apparently not originally a symbol of Speculative Masonry, being probably introduced from Hermetic Masonry, about 1776. McKay's Masonic dictionary tells us that the number of rungs on Jacob's Ladder varies but 7 is favoured, no doubt due to the mystical character of that number in many cultures. In the Persian Mysteries the number seven is given as the rungs, stages or degrees of attaining enlightenment.

The Torah identifies that the ladder's rungs signify the number of exiles the Jewish people would suffer before the coming of the Messiah. 'First the angel representing the exile of Persia climbed up 70 rungs and then fell down. It was a fourth angel, representing Rome/Edom, who finally climbed up into the clouds. Although the figure of 70 is used there is no definite number given for the rungs actually in the ladder and climbed by the fourth angel.

Kabbalistic interpretation of Jacobs Ladder is the link between the four Worlds, Divine, Spirit, Psyche and

Body. This linking of four Worlds, each with 10 Sefirot, gives a figure of 40 which signifies a complete process as mentioned in the Bible – 40 days and 40 nights Genesis ch7 v12, Moses was again with God for 40 days and 40 nights, Exodus ch34 v28 being but two instances.

The Ancients believed that Jacobs Ladder had 72 rungs with each rung representing a name of God. The Shemhamphorash, the explicit name of God, has a numerical number of 72. This according to the Hebrew belief that every letter has a numerical value.

A slightly differing view is the Muslim belief that Jacob's ladder is a symbol of God representing in its form the essence of Islam which gives much emphasis to following the 'straight path'. Martin Lings, in his 'Book of Certainty' describes the ladder thus, '...it is also the 'straight path', for indeed the way of religion is none other than the way of creation itself retraced from its end back to its Beginning'.

In the Masonic Ritual of the Working Tools the Plumb Rule is described thus '...which like Jacobs Ladder links heaven with earth.....' which is how Jacob's vision describes it, the rungs show the connection of God and Man. The question of whether there are 7 rungs, 72 rungs, or however many, may be considered immaterial to Freemasons for upon our Tracing Board standing on 3 rungs are the principle moral virtues - Faith, Hope and Charity. Faith in T.G.A.O.T.U, Hope in salvation and to be in Charity with all men.

Footnote: *Celtic legend suggests that the stone, known as the Stone of Destiny travelled from the Holy Land to Ireland around 700 BC, was then taken to Scotland in AD 870 where it was encased in the Scotlish Coronation Chair. In 1296 it was moved to a similar position in Westminster Abbey being placed under King Edward's Chair upon which British sovereigns are crowned.

It is understood that Russell will spend at least two days a week working there and now has plans for obtaining funding for a second clinic.

LETTER TO BRETHREN



Did you know the original `Tomb Thumb` was a Freemason? His name was Brother Charles Stratton. He was two feet high and weighed a mere 16 pounds and was a member of the St Johns Lodge in Connecticut.

Conversely, the world's largest Freemason was a Brother John ASSEN, a member of the Highland Park Lodge of Los Angeles. He was eight feet tall and weighed 38 stone. It took 12 brethren to raise him and there were 1500 at his initiation.

HE STILL SHOWS US THE WAY

Thirteen years after he passed to the Grand Lodge Above William Swinton Campbell Laurie (1931-2001) still guides they way for visitors to the North Shore Masonic Centre as the final piece of road we travel along, to the Centre, has carries his name. William Laurie Place. There can be few members of the Craft who are spoken about with such fond remembrance as Bill Laurie. Exemplary Freemason, friend, tireless worker, rugby aficionado, boatee, lover of Lion Red beer. The list of friends endearments is endless.

Sebastian Vettel, the F1 racing driver, said 'If the boat started shaking we stayed on course and did not lose focus. That made the difference', this could have been Bill's credo in Freemasonry and life in general. Legend has it that if you walk along Brown's Bay beach as dawn breaks you will see two sets of footprints those of Bill and his dog Jack. Concentrate and you will hear the opening of the Lodge in the three Degrees or Royal Arch Chapter followed by a number of Charges being rehearsed. This accompanied by frequent bursts of laughter as he had to ability to see humour in the most formal and solemn situation.

Visitors to his building in Auckland City often found him in a hammock slung below his metal parts storage system they also recount that he would most likely have a little blue or red book in his hand. Wherever Bill was Freemasonry was never far away.

His status as a Brother is shown in two diverse ways. As a Worshipful Master he is recorded as making 75 visits to other Lodges in a year which he did for 2 consecutive years. This was a very visible achievement and one never promoted was his charity. At the end of the refectory, when there was food left on the Festive Board at Takapuna Lodge, Bill would gathering up the left over fare and place it in his car.

He then did not drive to his home in Brown's Bay but turned left and traveled over the Harbour Bridge taking the food to the City Mission. This at a time when most Brethren attending the meeting had returned home and were asleep. He is also remembered for handing an envelope full of Dollar bills to Frank Ansell saying this is just an anonymous donation for the Installation. Bill had a passion for rugby and at the time of his passing he was the incumbent President of the North Shore Rugby Football Club, arguably the oldest rugby club in New Zealand. At one time he played in the front row for Grammar Old Boys and told a story of being instructed by his coach, the redoubtable Sir Fred Allen who became captain and coach of the All Blacks, to 'deal' with the Ponsonby front row, unusually on this occasion Bill was beaten to the punch quite literally. He remembered the front rows coming together but the next he recalled was regaining conciousness in the dressing room.

Worshipful Master, Secretary, raffle maestro at Roskill Masonic Village, Newsletter Editor, which was typed and carbon copied by his staff at W. S. Laurie, Bills fishing tackle company, all activities for which Bill never sought any accolade.



Together with Jim Williamson and Stu Mill, Bill was one of the instigators of the plan for a North Shore Masonic Centre. When the deal for a building in Shea Terrace, Takapuna fell through Bill took the collapse of the deal personally as though it were his failure, which it was not. Tragically he did not live to see the culmination of the project he was passionate in promoting so it is fitting that we are reminded of this extraordinary Brother when ever we attend the Lodge Rooms on the North Shore.
