THE SIGN OF REVERENCE AND THE SIGN OF FIDELITY

Emulation workers use the sign of the degree during Obligations, and in prayer, adopt what they call the sign of Reverence or sign of Prayer. Some years ago a discussion arose when the authority of the latter sign was challenged when it was maintained that it was not a Masonic sign at all and asking where in the course of the ceremonies it is taught. One brother actually replied that it was not taught at all in regular lodge but only in Lodges of Instructions, as though Lodges of Instructions have the right to invent a sign and impose it on the craft at large. It was asserted also that formerly Emulation had used the Sign of Fidelity during Obligations and there is definite indication in the Gilkes Ritual and in the Perfect Ceremonies of 1871 and 1874 that that was the case.

In the New Zealand Constitution the Sign of Reverence is right hand on heart with thumb beside finger.



The Sign of Fidelity (pronounced F-delity and not Fidelity), right hand on heart with thumb raised in the form of a square.

The Sign of Reverence will always be a subject of debate and in the New Zealand Constitution there can be no argument as to its use, as Grand Lodge has decreed that the Posture of Reverence is to be adopted during the Obligation and Prayers, as stipulated in the General Instructions, Section IV—Saluting, in the standard ritual book. In the Scottish Constitution, this sign is not recognised at all, and is never used. When the brethren are standing at anytime, during the ceremony or otherwise, and are not standing to order with the sign of the degree, the sign of fidelity is adopted. In true Masonic terms, the sign of Reverence or Prayer, is not a true and proper Masonic sign, it was adopted and used by the NZC, so as to be different.

The sign of Fidelity, which is an old English sign, was used as a gesture of recognition, and to acknowledge a greeting or act of courtesy. It was simply a token of good faith and over the years has been adopted by many organisations for different purposes.

100 Years Ago

From the minute book of Albion Lodge No. 45, 11 March 1915.

Correspondence:-

From the G. Secretary's Office re. G. Lodge Special War Benevolent Fund. The W.M. stated that the Prov. G.M.M.W Bro. O. Nicholson had a scheme in hand whereby each member of every Lodge in the Auckland Province would be asked to contribute according to his means to this fund. Circulars were being prepared and each member would receive a copy with the usual notice for the April meeting and the scheme would then be discussed and acted upon.

Raising of Bro. R.W. Parker:-

Bro. Parker presented himself to be raised to the Third Degree and being properly prepared was announced, admitted and Duly Obligated by the W.M. who also raised the candidate. W.Bro. Hounsell communicated the Secrets of the Degree. W.Bro. Armstrong gave the Traditional Secrets. The W. Tools were presented and explained by Bro. J.W. and Bro. S.W gave the Final Charge. Bro. Parker then received the Obligation Bible from the W.M. who also welcomed him as a full member of the Lodge.

The business of the evening being ended the Lodge was closed in Peace and Harmony with solemn prayer at 9.40 pm

young man passed a pawnbroker's shop. The money lender was standing in front of his shop and the young man noted that he was wearing a beautiful Masonic emblem. After going on a whole block, apparently lost in thought, the young man turned back, stepped up to the pawnbroker and addressed him: "I see you're wearing a Masonic emblem. I'm a Freemason too. It happens that I'm desperately in need of \$25 just now. I shall be able to repay it within ten days. You don't know me but I wonder whether the fact that vou are a Freemason and that I am a Freemason is sufficient to induce you to lend me the money on my personal note."

After a moments thought, the pawnbroker agreed to make the loan on the strength of the young man being a Freemason. Within a few days the young man repaid the loan as agreed and that ended the transaction. About four months later the young man was in a Lodge receiving the Entered Apprentice Degree; he had not really been

a Mason when he borrowed the \$25. After he had been admitted for the second section of the degree the young man looked across the Lodge room and saw the pawnbroker from whom he had borrowed the \$25. His face turned crimson and he became nervous and jittery. He wondered whether he had been recognized by the pawnbroker. Apparently not, so he planned at the first opportunity to leave the Lodge room and avoid his benefactor. As soon as the Lodge was closed he moved auickly for the door but the pawnbroker had recognized the young man, headed him off and to the young man's astonishment, approached him and greeted him with a smile and outstretched hand.

"Well, I see you weren't a
Freemason after all when you
borrowed that \$25" the
pawnbroker commented.
The blood rushed to the young
man's face as he stammered,
"No, I wasn't but I wish you'd
let me explain. I had always
heard that Freemasons were
charitable and ready to aid a
Brother in distress. When I
passed your shop that day I

didn't need that \$25. I had plenty of money in my wallet, but when I saw the Masonic emblem you were wearing, I decided to find out whether the things I'd heard about Freemasonry were true. You let me have the money on the strength of my being a Freemason, so I concluded that what I had heard about Masons was true, that they are charitable, that they do aid Brethren in distress. That made such a deep impression on me that I presented my petition to this Lodge and here I am. I trust that with this explanation you will forgive me for having lied to you."

The pawnbroker responded, "Don't let that worry you too much. I wasn't a Freemason when I let you have the money. I had no business wearing the Masonic emblem you saw. Another man had just borrowed some money on it, and it was so pretty that I put it on my lapel for a few minutes. I took it off the moment you left. I didn't want anyone else borrowing money on the strength of my being a Freemason. When you asked for that \$25, I remembered what I had heard about Masons, that they were honest, upright, and cared for their obligations promptly. It seemed to me that \$25 wouldn't be too much to lose to learn if what I'd heard was really true, so I lent you the money and you repaid it exactly as you said you would. That convinced me that what I'd heard about Masons was true so I presented my petition to this Lodge. I was the candidate just ahead of you."

In a large box full of old files and papers, in a strongroom at Freemasons Hall, was found a packet containing a foolscap-size volume, bound in red leather, with a Royal Arch symbol blocked in gold on its cover. Bound into it were fourteen sheets of paper closely written on both sides.

At the top of the first page was the word 'Approved', followed by the signature of HRH Augustus Frederick, Duke of Sussex, First Grand Principal 1810-1843, and the letters GMZ, Grand Master Zerubbabel. The Duke's initials appear at the foot of many of the pages, followed by the letters GMZ and on the last page he had written 'Approved Newstead Abbey, Nottingham, November 2 1834', followed by his full signature.

Newstead Abbey was formerly an Augustinian priory but became a domestic home following the Dissolution of the Monasteries by Henry VIII. It was once the family home of the poet Lord Byron and had been sold to Colonel Thomas Wildman, Provincial Grand Master for Nottinghamshire 1823-1859, the Duke of Sussex was staying there as his guest.

The manuscript proved to be an introduction covering the testing of a candidate for membership of the Royal Arch and the ritual for the opening of a Chapter, the admission of a new Companion and the closing of the Chapter. Having been approved and signed by the Duke of Sussex, it leaves little reason to doubt that the manuscript was the work of a special committee he set up in 1834 to establish what were the ceremonies of the Royal Arch.

In 1813 the original Grand Chapter gave its First Grand Principal, the Duke of Sussex, full authority to make whatever arrangements he deemed necessary and proper for the Royal Arch. The Grand Chapter did not meet again until 1817 when the Duke of Sussex summoned the original Grand Chapter and the members of the 'Antients' former Royal Arch and united them into the United Grand Chapter, a name that lasted until the title of Supreme Grand Chapter was adopted.

In 1834, there being doubt as to what the proper ceremonies were, the Duke of Sussex set up a special committee to investigate and recommend to the Grand Chapter what they should be. This they did and their deliberations were approved by both the Duke and the Grand Chapter. It was then ordered that they should be adopted by all of Chapters.

The special committee was given a time-limited charter as the Chapter of Promulgation, its remit being to give demonstrations of the ceremonies in London to which Chapters were invited to send representatives. At that time ritual was passed on by rote and it was a heinous masonic crime to write down or print ritual material. Indeed, a number of characters, such as William Finch and George Claret, were charged with breaking their obligations by printing portions of the ritual or catechetical lectures.

The discovery of this manuscript enabled what did happen to be established and increase the knowledge of how Royal Arch ritual developed.
